


SHERBURN HOSPITAL

The hospital held land from around the Thornley and Wheatley Hill Area


Sherburn is a medieval hospital located in a hamlet to the southeast of Durham, founded in 1181 by Hugh de Puiset

Alexander Kelloe was a benefactor of the Hospital at Sherburn in 1260 and Richard Kellaw was a Bishop of Durham in 1311

**Thornley House Almshouses,

Sherburn Hospital was founded by Bishop Pudsey and the great tithe of Kelloe was appointed to the hospital

Thornley and Wheatley Hill came under this tithe. There is evidence to the connection - The Thornley Almshouses at Sherburn Hospital and the Thornley Porch at St Helen's Church, Kelloe

Kelloe church continued in the patronage of Sherburn until 1579 when Bishop Barnes collated to it in his own right

Even as recent as the late 1800s, people from Wheatley Hill and Thornley continued to be baptised, married and buried at Kelloe
