COMMEMORATING THE FIRST WORLD WAR

11pm on the 4 August 1914 marked the beginning of The Great War where over 9 million people were killed worldwide and which paved the way for major political changes, including revolutions in many of the nations involved.

There were many reasons why large numbers of men joined the armed forces from the colliery villages of East Durham, Wheatley Hill being no exception and 189 from this village were killed and are proudly remembered on our war memorial in the cemetery. We remember them every year on 11 November, and this year, the centenary of the start of the conflict, we will join the rest of the Nation, in commemorating the part in which the men and women from Wheatley Hill played in the 5th deadliest conflict in world history.

The village commemorations will start with our July History Club meeting - "World War 1 Recruitment Records" by Dr Sarah Price on 30 July, and will run through the weekend until the evening of Monday 4 August. We have brought the date of our Local History Day, which is held in Wheatley Hill

Workingmens Club, forward to <u>Saturday 2 August</u> to fit in with the rest of the village events.

At this event we will have our website on display with the new updates for which we received money from the Haswell Windfarms (*Jan 2014 newsletter*) This is another way in which to present historical information to another generation.

Also at our event on Saturday we will be launching the Heritage Society's new DVD - The Contribution of Wheatley Hill and Thornley People to World War 1. The DVD has been produced by Pauline Carr with a voice-over by Billy Middleton and presents in a humbling way, the sacrifices made by our local people during the War to end all Wars?

For WW1 commemoration purposes, the History Club has presented information on the village's contributions in written form, website and DVD, in order to try a nd reach a new generation. Our advertising will be done by social media and traditional means in order to get the word out there. Rosy Rapids ladies' footballers

I READ with interest the article on early football teams in your November issue, 'Origins of our Beautiful Game', and it reminded me of a photograph that I submitted to a book by Patrick Brennan in 2007, The Munitionettes – A History of Women's Football in North East England During the Great War.

The book tells of women during the First World War, thrown together in munitions factories, who formed football teams in order to raise money for the war effort. Until the publication of Patrick's book there was little known about this, even among family members.

As the chair of the Wheatley Hill History Club in County Durham, I submitted the photograph we had of our local women's football team for inclusion in the book, and was delighted when Mr Brennan contacted me to say that the picture was much earlier than any he had

come across in the North East of England. In his book, he states under the image, 'The Rosy Rapids may have been the first women's football team in the (North East) region.'

I was able to supply the names of most of the 1909 players, and along the bottom of the image it says, 'Wheatley Hill Rosy Rapids AFC – Engagements Wanted'.

Unlike the rest of the teams in Patrick Brennan's book, the Rapids seem to have been a local team and not one that was connected to the munitions work taking place in the North East of England.

I don't have any more information on the Rosy Rapids other than this. My history group have done research from newspapers in our area from 1830-1976, word processing all articles relating to the village and publishing them in seven volumes.

Unfortunately, there was no mention of the women's football team. Perhaps it wasn't newsworthy enough or perhaps they didn't get any games!


