FAMOUS GRAVES



Peter Lee Wheatley Hill Cemetery Wheatley Hill, County Durham

July 1864 - 16 June, 1935 (aged 71)

Trade unionist Peter Lee began work in a county Durham colliery aged just 10 and later had a town named in his honour. As a miner's leader, preacher and local politician, he improved work and living conditions for the local mining community. It was later said of him: "He gave all, asking nothing in return, little dreaming that a great New Town would bear his name."

His grave in Wheatley Hill cemetery is a listed monument.

We have managed to have Miners Leader, Peter Lee included on a website "Famous Graves Finder". It's a website that gives details of where late-greats, legends and historic figures are laid to rest in the UK. We are delighted that Peter Lee has been included. The site is administered from South Africa, so naturally when the History Club made an application to have Peter added, they had never heard of him. It took almost three years, whilst they carried out their own research, but eventually agreed that he was famous enough to be included. This makes his inclusion even more special - someone else recognising his achievements!

The tower has a grade II listing.

THE MEMOIRS OF THOMAS RUSSELL

(1847 - 1928)

(During the short time he lived in Wheatley Hill)

15 November 1877, Wheatley Hill Colliery

In Affectionate Remembrance of John Morley who died October the 7, 1872 aged 30 years. Can pen describe the mornful sigh to hear the widows children cry. O come dear Father come to me but no he's in Eternity.

24 November 1877, Wheatley Hill Colliery

I went to Wingate Station with our Ellion and Mary Ann. Thay were goen to see their father and mother and when I came back I had to cut Thomas Grenwell's pig up and I am tired but I think I will go to my bed and I hope I will get a god night's rest and trust to the Lord.

27 November 1877, Wheatley Hill Colliery

Was the day I toke the forst payment for killing a pig and Thomas Grenwell was the man. I charged him 1s.2d but Sarah gave me 1s.6d for it so I toke it.

30 November 1877, Wheatley Hill Colliery

This was the day that we gave in for Shotton a enging house in the main coal seam and our price was £85. Thomas Grenwell, John Grenwell, William Greenwell, Thomas Russell.

7 December 1877, Wheatley Hill Colliery

This is the day that I made my sones little horse and we were ideal today. But we are goen to work tomorrow and that is pay Friday. Thinges is loken very dull.

7 December 1877, Wheatley Hill Colliery

It did not say the date when this was rote but I think it would be 18 of April.

"Dear wife and famley I am sorry that I can give no account for this action but a depressed state of mind. Hoping God will show more kindeness than the earthly father and by you get this I am no more your husband and father. My loving all. John Howie".

8 December 1877, Wheatley Hill Colliery

This bein pay Fridda night me and our Ellion has ben to Thornley and it was a fine night and I went to see Gorge Lonsdale but he was not in. So we went to the stor and got some thinges and came down home again and had our supper and went to bed. So I will bid you good night pen and ink and book.

10 December 1877, Wheatley Hill Colliery

Well Ellion I think you have done well. You have got the stockin a long way on. You are goen to finish them sone if you do not mind excuse me Ellion (It looks as if Ellen is making stockings, maybe for Christmas)

10 December 1877, Wheatley Hill Colliery

Dear Reader. You may think it strange of me for making a mamerand (memorandum) of this but it toke me about ten years to complete. I was married at Brancepeth Colliery in sixty-seven and I finished in seventy seven paying for furnutey (furniture) and I have paid a good amount to Spark of Haswell Lane. (Henry Spark was a cabinet maker living in Haswell Lane, Haswell, so this entry could refer to a piece of furniture that Thomas had made at the time of his marriage to Ellen)

11 December 1877, Wheatley Hill Colliery

Myself and William Stoker was hewen at the Clippers flat but we started for William Burt in the main coal seam and we like it verry well and we started on this date.

11 December 1877, Wheatley Hill Colliery

Mary Ann and Ellion and myself were talking about shifting to Monkwearmouth Colliery but we do not know that thay can get there yet but tyme will try it

11 December 1877, Wheatley Hill Colliery

Ellion Russell do good with what thou have or it will do thou no good

17 December 1877, Wheatley Hill Colliery

This was the day that Mary Ann got word from South Wingate by to boys and thay called themselves Butterfield. William was away on that day and thay said he had to go to see the master. (The Mary Ann referred to here is probably Thomas's brother William's wife)

26 December 1877, Wheatley Hill Colliery

I thought I would make a note of the day that Mary Ann shifted to Hardbushes and it was on this date and two days after Christmas day. (Thomas probably means that his sister-in-law (sister of wife Ellen and her husband William Heseltine) moved to Hartbushes, South Wingate on 27 December)

28 December 1877, Wheatley Hill Colliery

I was at a temperance meeting on this date but it stayed on rather long. There was a little reding and a little singen but not much of either and I hope it will get better soon. The night is clarty and dark and cold so I will have my supper and go to bed.

10 January 1878, Wheatley Hill Colliery

This been about half past eight at night I thought I would sit down and emuse myself a little. Well I have to go to my work at nine o'clock and thought I would read a little of Robert Burns but I am stif with sitting and can do nothing. William shifted from Thornley today. (This entry may refer to Thomas' brother William Russell)
