

Following the article in the October newsletter concerning a lost watch, member Bill Luke has provided us with another 'lost' watch story from his family:

GRANDFATHER'S WATCH

William Luke, grandfather to our member William Luke, was a deputy at Wheatley Hill pit and was given a solid silver watch with gold lettering as a twenty-first birthday present.

He too lost his watch in the pit for over a year until he dreamt where it was and got it back!!

The watch was passed on to his son, John Luke when William died and John in turn loaned to his brother William (of Luke Terrace fame). Uncle Bill forgot to take the watch out of his pit trouser pocket and his wife, Aunt Bella, not knowing this, did as she always did to remove the excess dust, dadded the trousers viciously against the wall with the watch in the pocket. The watch was returned to John Luke and it cost him three weeks wages to have it repaired!

Bill, who sent this article, still has the watch and reports that it still going strong!!

INTERESTING HEADSTONE

During the summer, of 2014 a headstone in the Thornley churchyard was brought to my attention by Fred Bromilow. The words on the headstone read:

Elizabeth, wife of Thomas Holloway, Comedian, Died 28 May 1902 aged 36 years

The name 'Holloway', especially with the description 'Comedian' made us both think that maybe Thomas was related to the famous comedian, Stanley Holloway.

I quickly discovered that Holloway is a very common name in the Midlands and South of England and that Thomas was born in 1864 in the Coventry area, four years after George Augustus Holloway, the father of Stanley who was born in London. Further research indicated that Stanley Holloway's family were mainly from the London area but not involved in entertainment or the theatre until he became an entertainer. On the other hand, Thomas' great grandfather, Joseph Holloway, born in London in 1797 described himself as a 'comedian' on the 1841 census and every subsequent census until his death in 1881. This show-business link carried through Thomas' family, his grandfather, also Joseph was the proprietor of a 'Travelling Theatre' which was obviously passed on to Thomas through his father. On the 1901 census Thomas was described as "Proprietor of Portable Theatre" and Elizabeth as an actress—they were based at West Herrington, Sunderland at this time.

Thomas married Elizabeth in Battersea in 1885 and interestingly on their marriage document Thomas was described as a comedian as were his father and Elizabeth's father, Samuel Hudson, so there is no doubt that this family were firmly rooted in the world of entertainment.

An article in The Era, a weekly theatrical newspaper on 2 March 1879 may throw some light on why Thomas and Elizabeth were in the North East at the time of Elizabeth's death in 1902.

It appears that one of the theatres in Thornley was advertising for such acts that the Holloway family could provide and it may be that they responded to the above advertisement and continued to visit Thornley on a regular basis over the years. In all census returns, the family are always living in a caravan so that their show was portable to be taken around the country. Each of Thomas and Elizabeth's three children were born in Kettering, Herefordshire and Gloucestershire over a 4-year period, giving an indication of the amount of travelling that they did. Elizabeth states that her place of birth is Dewsbury, Yorkshire, but given that she too came from a theatrical family, there is no evidence to suppose that she had real roots there. It is sad though that her descendants probably don't know that she is buried in a church yard in Thornley, County Durham and that she has a headstone.

So whilst there is no family connection to the family of Stanley Holloway, the headstone has high-lighted some interesting facts about the entertainment industry, Thornley and the Holloway family. Sadly, Thomas died only two years after Elizabeth in 1904, in Newark, Nottingham.


