
In her book, Mrs Brown has asked lots of celebrities how the presence of their grandmothers helped shape their lives, in their own unique way.

WHEATLEY HILL BOYS SCHOOL CYCLING CLUB - TRIP TO EDMONDBYERS

On 27th December 1950, six of us went on the first school cycling tour. The names of the boys who went were John Purvis, Robert Dawson, Edward Fulcher, Leslie Alderton, Edward Lawson and the leader was Mr Brown. After meeting at Mr Brown's home at half past nine, we set out over snow covered roads which changed to rutted iced roads near Durham. When we got to Durham, the roads were better because there was a lot of traffic running over the snow and beating the snow down to make a smooth surface. We stopped at Witton Gilbert for a cup of tea and then pushed on to Lanchester where we got our dinner. From there, we went to Black Hill and at the top of Black Hill we had a spill which caused us to walk to the bottom. Ten more miles and we would be at Edmondbyers. That day we did about 35 miles. When we got to the hostel we had to wait of Mrs Sanderson to open it up and at five o'clock we went in.

On our second day the roads were ice bound and were impassable as far as Stanhope so we went on a 4.5 mile walk to Blanchland. On our way we saw a lame rabbit down a burrow.

On the 3rd day we got up and made our breakfast then got washed. Mrs Sanderson told us how to avoid half of Black Hill bank. When we got to the top of Black Hill bank we bought an ice cream. When we set off the roads were not so bad. When we got home we told our parents that we had a very nice time. (74 miles in total).

HISTORY CLUB IS 15 YEARS OLD

The History Club in Wheatley Hill has been running for 15 years at the end of January 2010. The first meeting took place in January 1995 and after a shaky start, I think you will agree, this particular organisation has gone from strength to strength.

Our successes over the years have been the publication of seven books on our own account and one which we did in conjunction with Durham County Council. This is a magnificent achievement and due in no small way to Owen Rowland, who has famously sat for hours on end in either Durham City Library or the Durham County Records Office, looking through newspaper articles. We cannot thank him enough for his dedication. Tom Tunney, Owen and Fred Bromilow were the main researchers for the war books.

As well as the books, we have transcribed all census materials from 1841-1901 for Thornley, Wheatley Hill and Ludworth, we have published a calendar every year and put the village well and truly on the map with our annual Local History Days.

A big thank you to everyone who has made this a successful 15 years, and I hope we all have the strength to continue for another 15!!

This will be a **free event** for our regulars in order to say thank you for your continued support.
