The classic cars organised by Bob Waite outside the Club, once again created lots of interest, particularly as it was such a beautiful, sunny day. Our resident photographer, Pauline Carr was kept busy inside and out with both moving and still images this year!

Our local MP, Phil Wilson also paid a visit to the event and was impressed with the displays. He took to Twitter on the same afternoon singing our praises and asked to be kept informed of future events.

MEMORIES OF MR T W THOMPSON

Mr Thompson was a resident of Wheatley Hill who passionately believed in progress and science. He started to jot things down that were of interest to himself, in 1900. Reproduced here are his Wheatley Hill jottings:

- 9 July 1935 Thornley Colliery celebrated their Centenary of coal drawing, when the first coal drawn from Thornley Colliery was shipped at Hartlepool Docks, which was newly opened on 9 July 1835. The Colliery Company in former years had bad times and the company went bankrupt and failed and could not pay the miners wages due to them and there was Putt Pay no wages in the year 1884 and after the colliery was idle for about a year, it was opened by the Weardale Steel Coal & Coke Company
- 14 July 1935 The public urinal for gentlemen only, situated on the site near the Rock Buildings, Wheatley Hill was rebuilt and opened for general use
- Summer 1935 Was the hottest on record according to the Royal Observatory, Greenwich The summer was late in coming after a late and cold spring, snow and cold weather till the end of June but when the heat came it lasted till the end of August with no rain for six weeks. Haytime and harvest were finished by the end of August
- 19 Oct 1935 Great storm of wind and hurricane at the rate of 90 miles per hour and lasting two days, doing great damage all over the north of the country
- The public telephone box transferred from the General Post Office at Wheatley Hill to a site in the main street for the public to use at any time
- January 1836 Great change at Wheatley Hill Colliery Power Station. The colliery company scrapped the turbine electric engines and commenced to buy all the electric current for machinery and everything on the colliery site. All engines had to have new motors for the new current and the new steam turbine compressed air engine commenced and the colliery buzzer to be blown by compressed air
- 1 Jan 1936 Street lamps improved at the colliery places and coloured lamps of 1000 candle power at the busiest crossings in County Durham. The big lamps were lit in Wheatley Hill on 1st January
- 10 Jan 1936 The worst storm of wind and rain on record in the north east at up to 100mph. Much damage done to houses at Wheatley Hill colliery with roofs being blown off and many people injured
- 12 Jan 1936 New electric driven engine, and cotton ropes to the fan shaft at Wheatley Hill Colliery
- 10 April 1936 The worst Easter Holidays on record for snow, frost and cold north winds after a long and severe winter. Holiday resorts deserted with a great loss to their trade
- August 1936 Wheatley Hill Colliery slum clearance commenced when Patton Street, Webb Street etc were closed and the tenants moved to the council houses
- Summer 1936 The illuminations and floodlights, the first of any importance in the North East of England, were visited by many people at Roker
- 1 May 1937 Durham County surface workers commenced a 48 hour week, exclusive of meal times at a basic wage of 4/3d per day
- 5 March 1938 The new workingmens club opened on the council estate after transferring from the Crows House estate in Wheatley Hill
- 21 April 1938 No 2 Winding Engine replaced with a new drum, new steam brake and overwinding apparatus. The pit was idle 5 days over the Easter weekend so that the work could be completed. Coal work resumed on this day
- Durham County Miners and all surface workers, mechanics, enginemen etc commenced a summer holiday of 6 days with pay 3 days in the summer of 1938 and 6 days holiday each year afterwards commencing in 1939
- 19 Sept 1938 New picture hall "The Regal" situated on the Wilkinsons Estate near the workmans club opened today
- 17 Oct 1938 New school for senior girls situated on the Wilkinsons Estate at Wheatley Hill opened today
- 1 Dec 1938 The Palace Theatre in the Front Street, Wheatley Hill, remodelled, improved and named "The Royalty" opened
- 30 Mar 1939 The new picture house at Thornley Colliery "The Ritz" opened today
- 16 Sept 1939 Wheatley Hill pit head baths opened
- Aug 1940 Old Age Pensions increased to £1.15s per week
- May 1941 Wheatley Hill aerial flight changed to the new standards for the tipping of stone etc
 - The Five-Quarter seam at Wheatley Hill re-opened and commenced work
- The cage guides repaired at No 1 pit and keps and cage guides repaired and new kep bunting at the No 2 Pit Hutton Seam
