The Death of our Queen

The death of our Queen on 8 September was a shock to us all, and whilst she was 96 years old, a surprise too as we had all seen images of her in the press and on TV of her meeting with new Prime Minister, Liz Truss, just two days before. As usual she was smiling and few would have considered that her death was so imminent.

Queen Elizabeth II was a much loved Monarch and for many of us the only Monarch we had ever known. She was part of our history



for just over 70 years and was a constant in our lives on Christmas Day, Remembrance, Trooping the Colour etc and whilst many of us never met her, we knew she was there. Her passing has, as might be expected, created national grieving with flowers and other tributes being left outside the Royal residences in order to mark respect.

On Monday 12 September a Service of Prayer and Reflection remembering Her Majesty was held at All Saints Church, Wheatley Hill at 6.00pm. There were about 30 people present who listened to the words of reflection by our vicar, Rev Jane and County Councillors Lucy Hovells and Ivan Cochrane. We sang three hymns, and generally remembered. There was a condolence book in the church which members of the congregation were invited to sign.

After the service, and in the car park of the church, County and Parish Councillor Jake Miller read out the Accession Proclamation which was followed by the National Anthem in which we replaced the word "Queen" with "King". This is something that many of us will never experience again in our lifetime which made it unique, historical and moving.



THE HETTON COAL COMPANY BICENTENARY

You may be wondering why the Hetton Coal Company bicentenary is important enough to be included in our newsletter. The answer is that without the Hetton experiment that took place early in the 1820's, none of the South East Durham pits would have been opened, including Thornley, Wheatley Hill and Ludworth.

The South East of County Durham stands on a magnesian limestone plateau and whilst coal was mined in the Houghton-le-Spring, Gateshead, Washington areas of the County long before 1820, the limestone made it impossible to gain access to the coal below it.

The land owners in the areas mentioned, Lord Londonderry, Lord Lambton and other Lords and Squirearchy, always claimed, "There's no coal under the limestone". What they meant was, "if there is coal under there its going to take a lot of money to get it out and we aren't prepared to invest in such a venture".

Test borings carried out in 1796 by professional borers, Messrs Rawlings of Ferryhill, found that the coal was 500 feet underground but the need to remove excess water and sand during drilling would be prohibitive to a successful sinking without the correct equipment.


In 1820, sacked from his job as manager at the Vane Tempest pit by Lord Londonderry, failed banker, Arthur Mowbray saw an opportunity to open a pit at Hetton, probably to annoy Lord Londonderry, and he obtained the rights to mine coal at there.

Without finance, but with a banking background, Mowbray was able to gain the interest of those who could afford it, to make an investment and start the coal company. Not content with upsetting the local landowners by opening a pit on their doorstep that they had no control over, Mowbray also went on to poach skilled workers from them.

The problem of transporting the coal from Hetton to the Sunderland Staithes was another obstacle that Mowbray had to overcome and he turned to George Stephenson to plan a railway from the pit, over Warden Law and down to Sunderland using a combination of hauled engines and gradients on the land.

The opening of the Hetton Colliery was significant in that it represented a number of firsts;

- The first deep coal mine in the world
- The first deep coal mine to drill through the magnesian limestone plateau
- The first coal venture to be funded by private money and not landowners
- The first time a railway was used to transport coal



Mowbray continued to be awkward with the rest of the coal owners who were governed by the Vend - a system that set production limits in order to maintain prices. The Vend committee told members how much they could produce and sell. Mowbray ignored the limits put on production at Hetton and therefore sales, and sold as much as he could produce which infuriated the Vend committee made up of Lord Ravensworth, Lord Lambton, the Marques of Londonderry and other significant land owners.

When the Hetton pit was found to be successful, the company then sunk other pits within the previously land-locked South East Durham area and Thornley was one of them. The plans for the building of pit cottages at Hetton for the new miners in the 1820's were used to build the houses at Thornley, Ludworth and Wheatley Hill and probably all other pits opened by the Hetton Company. One of the first streets of houses built at Hetton was Francis Street, which was transported brick by brick to Beamish Museum when the pit closed and now represents the colliery cottages in the pit village.
