

Local Labour Party Pioneers Number 2 William Snaith Part 2

As a much more privileged and extremist local Labour Party leadership took over in the aftermath of Peter Lee's death in 1935, William Snaith voiced his disquiet with this March 1937 letter to his one-time Thornley colleague on the Easington Rural District Council, Hubert Tunney:

'I have watched very closely the recent elections with disgust. I feel very much for you after years of loyal service for humanity, you have been subject to such foolish abuse. One thing that to me stands out in your life is your unblemished character which in the future will be your strong rock. I have admired your stand for right, ever since we became acquainted you seemed to me to stand out above your fellows in administration of all local government work and I trust that you will not be downhearted....'

Though he had been re-elected *unopposed* as Chairman of Thornley Miners' Lodge earlier that same year and had served on the ERDC since 1919, Tunney had just been forced to run, and lose, as an independent 'Trade Union Socialist' candidate after Thornley Labour Party chose Thornley school headmaster E F Peart (also the Secretary of the Seaham Division Labour Party) and his 23-year-old Durham University graduate son Fred (who later became the long-serving MP for Workington and Leader of both the House of Commons and the House and Lords) as their candidates for the ERDC. The Labour Party's truly bizarre -- and successful -- 1937 choice of candidate to oppose Tunney for Peter Lee's old DCC seat, Wheatley Hill miner Frank Quin, born in 1867 and out of politics since his 1931 ERDC defeat, will be the subject of a future profile. *

In 1938, Snaith was one of the many Wheatley Hill men to receive a 'pioneer diploma' for over 50 years membership of the DMA (HM 14/11/38, p7). Frank Quin was another while, at Thornley, Peter Lee's brother John was another notable recipient. (SE 17/11/38 p 4).

On January 1st 1947, on Vesting Day, aged 77 and still employed as a pick sharpener, Snaith was the oldest employee at Wheatley Hill Colliery and had the honour of raising the NCB flag to celebrate the nationalisation of the mine. He was one of 114 older men made compulsorily redundant later that year. (YP 21/10/47 p 1)

He was living at 11 Gowland Terrace, Wheatley Hill when he died, aged 82, in 1951. A newspaper obituary noted that he had lived in the village since 1889.

There is no street in Wheatley Hill named after William Snaith. Perhaps there should have been, but his memory still shines, ever so faintly, every time a new reader turns to Chapter 12 of Jack Lawson's grand old book:

'In August 1914, Peter Lee was in Edinburgh on one of his cycling tours with his friend William Snaith. They, like the rest of the working masses had left work far behind and put it out of mind...'.

* When the DCC boundaries changed in 1937, Louis Martin continued to serve for Wingate and Frank Quin was elected to the revised Thornley and Wheatley Hill seat. Teddy Cain took over in 1946 and E F Peart in 1949, both peacefully uncontested.


